Be Bright, Be Seen – Monday 16th October

We are always mindful for the safety of our children near to roads and conscious of how vulnerable they can be. Therefore, we are sending out an important reminder to these dangers as autumn draws in and the clocks go back an hour on Sunday 29th October, signalling the end of British Summer Time. At this time of year there is reduced visibility for drivers and pedestrians as a result.

To help raise your child's awareness of this issue, on Monday 16th October, we would like children to wear their school uniforms but with an added bit of brightness e.g. fluorescent socks or a reflective tabard. This emphasises how wearing brightly coloured clothing shows up well in daylight but as it gets dark, reflective clothing and accessories are far more effective in highlighting pedestrians through car headlights or streetlamps.

Show Racism the Red Card

Next Friday is the annual 'Show Racism the Red Card Day'. We will be celebrating this day at St Louis with a range of activities.

 Next Wednesday 18th October all KS2 classes will be completing a 'Reject Racism' workshop with some external visitors. Years 3 and 4 will be focusing on what racism is and the harm it can cause. They will study the similarities and differences between us all and learn how important it is to celebrate these differences. Years 5 and 6 will look in more depth at the different forms racism can take, understand the harm of stereotypes and misinformation and become more confident in knowing how to deal with or challenge people who make racist comments.

- On Friday we will celebrate Show Racism the Red Card as a whole school. All children are to wear their school uniform (or PE kit if it is their PE day) but wear a red item with it eg: a hair ribbon, hat, pair of socks, scarf, tie etc.
- KS1 will have lessons about celebrating differences, showing kindness towards everyone and God loving us all. This will mainly be taught through story books and children will complete an activity to show the impact unkind words can have on people.
- The whole school will also be learning about an important person from history as part of Black History month. This year's theme is 'Saluting our Sisters' to honour the achievements of black women. We will of course 'Salute our Brothers' too. When looking at these people, we will learn about the significant impact they have had on the world and discuss why in the past they may not have been noticed or acknowledged for it.
- All racism and black history month lessons will also be linked to our faith. Many stories in the Bible highlight how Jesus wanted us to welcome, love and care for everyone, regardless of gender, race or religion.
- We will have a whole school assembly to reinforce the message of 'Show Racism the Red Card Day' and all pupil of the weeks will be based around the 'Caring' aspect of our curriculum to highlight those children who are showing the love and kindness towards everyone that we want to see at St Louis as good followers of Christ.
- In the afternoon, all children will meet with their buddies to talk about their day and share information on the person they learnt about for black history month. I am sure the children will also enjoy some playtime with their buddy which will be a great way to finish off this half term.

Reception

We have been learning: about the different zones of regulation. We know the green zone means we are happy and calm, the red zone means we are angry and mad, blue means we are sad and tired and yellow means we are feeling silly and worried. You can help at home by: discussing the different zones of regulation and how your child can get back in the green zone.

Year 1

We have been learning: how to subtract using a number line. You can help at home by: giving your child subtraction questions that they can solve with a number line.

Year 2

We have been learning: how to measure using a ruler. You can help at home by: asking your child to measure items around the house, perhaps estimating the length first.

Year 3

We have been learning: about what life was like during the Bronze Age compared to life now.

You can help at home by: asking your child what facts they can recall about the Bronze Age.

Year 4

We have been learning: about the 7 continents in geography. You can help at home by: asking your child to name the 7 continents.

Year 5

We have been learning: about detective mystery stories. You can help at home by: asking your child what their mystery story is going to be about - what is the crime and who the culprit is.

Year 6

We have been learning: about adding and subtracting fractions.

You can help at home by: asking about the different challenges when adding and subtracting fractions.
